**Objectifs pédagogiques du cours :**

This course will use multi-media to support teaching, allowing for interactive teaching and learning. Students will be provided with input on the topic but at the same time they will be encouraged to develop their analytic capacity and to prepare and complement topics through personal study.

**Contenu / descriptif du cours :**

This class intends to analyze the development of international relations from the late 19th to the early 21st century. Special attention will be given to the system of political and military alliances but also to the economic mechanisms and the pressure of public opinion and the evolution of related mentalities. In the first semester the lecture will recall the foundations and of international relations in the 19th century (Congress of Vienna, Westphalian system, colonization and the emergence of Japan and the USA). It will then address the Great War, the rise of the authoritarianism in the interwar period, advancing to the end of World War II and its immediate aftermath. The second semester deals with the reconstruction of post-war Europe and the shaping of a new world order. The evolution and the end of the Cold War, the emergence of the Third World, the conflicts in the Middle East, the European project and the role of the US after the fall of the Berlin Wall are going to be the main topics of this class. It will end with the events of 9/11 and their repercussions.
