<b>Objectifs du cours / Course objectives</b>	<p>This course is designed to give the students a general understanding of the challenges of the digital revolution in a democratic perspective. The effects of new technologies are clearly visible within the national state and across borders: from the Arab Spring to the influence of Russian hackers on the American elections, from Facebook privacy challenges to the spread of “big data” in governmental affairs, examples are many and new democratic questions are raised.</p> <p>Such challenges call for innovations in the design of democratic institutions. In our current model of government, an elite group of elected/appointed leaders is supposed to solve critical problems on their own, without engaging the experience of the people they represent. Most governments fail to use modern technologies. Their use could enhance democratic governance as these technologies already impact the models of representative democracy and centralized bureaucracy or the system of legal rules and processes that generally prohibits rapid experimentation by government institutions. However, significant initiatives are developing today: open data for public use, participative local budgeting and direct citizen’s control of public funds or assembly</p>			

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	<p>of citizens to amend a constitution.</p> <p>The course intends to shed light on some of the processes brought by new technologies, regarding democratic challenges, impact on fundamental freedoms, new approaches of political participation, influence of big data on security, health care or environmental policies... Case studies will be used throughout the course, regarding situations in the United States, Europe, China, India, Brazil...</p>
